

The premise is that the aesthetic, far from being secondary or supplemental to the forces shaping the earth, is centrally entailed and embedded in dynamics of geopower. Between 24 - 28 August 2024, the triennial International Conference of the IAWIS will be hosted in Amsterdam. The theme of this edition and object analysis. Jitte Waagen nominated for Klokhuis Wetenschapsprijs

With his research into the ways in which drones can help us detect castles that have disappeared underground, archaeologist Jitte Waagen (UvA 4D Research Lab) has been nominated for the *Klokhuis Wetenschapsprijs* 2024. This annual award is awarded to scientific research that is of interest and relevant to children between the ages of 9 and 12, to familiarise a broad and young audience with scientific research in the Netherlands. New research priority area Decolonial Futures launched

In January 2024, the new research priority area (RPA) Decolonial Futures was launched at UvA, involving the faculties of Humanities, Law, and Social and Behavioural Sciences. The RPA will run for 5 years and aims to create new research collaborations, methods, dialogues, and networks for thinking about what the 'decolonial' means - in transhistorical and interdisciplinary ways. Tiele-fellowship for Dr. Marjolein Hogenbirk

In January 2024, Marjolein Hogenbirk was officially awarded a Tielefellowship. The Tiele-fellowship program encourages academic research of books in the present, past, and future. The research of those awarded the fellowship will be financially and academically supported by the Tiele foundation for the duration of two months. Hogenbirk will use the fellowship to research re-used parchment from the 'Lancelot compilation' from circa 1320, with the use of techniques derived from modern photography. This will lead to new insights about the work methods of authors, copyists and illuminators who produced handwritings, and about their (lost) texts. Congratulations Marjolein!

New AHM Members

Dr. Arnoud Arps

Arnoud Arps has joined AHM in February 2024 as an Assistant Professor of Extended Cinema, Film Heritage and Memory. His work investigates how the colonial era is transculturally, transnationally, and cross-medially remembered in the Netherlands and Indonesia ,with a special interest in cinema, literature, and popular culture. Prior to joining AHM he was a Niels Stensen Postdoctoral Fellow in Postcolonial and Memory Studies consecutively affiliated with the University of Oxford hosted by Elleke Boehmer and the University of California, Los Angeles hosted by Michael Rothberg. He is currently hosting Rebekah Vince within the context of a collaborative project on postcolonial memories.

AHM Visiting Scholar / Dr. Rebekah Vince

Rebekah Vince is a Lecturer (Assistant Professor) in French with Comparative Literature at Queen Mary University of London specialising in French postmemory narratives, francophone postcolonial studies, and the Mediterranean francosphere. She joined AHM as a Visiting Scholar in January 2024. Here, she will focus on Etty Hillesum, a Dutch diarist of WWII in postcolonial perspective, through the lens of French-Algerian author Karima Berger. Together with Arnoud Arps she will organise a workshop that explores transnational connections across memory studies and postcolonial studies in relation to Dutch and French (anti)colonialism following WWII through comparative analysis of cultural representations such as film and literature.

Nederland en de herinnering aan de Jodenvervolging 1945 -

On January 17, *Nederland en de herinnering aan de Jodenvervolging* ('The Netherlands and the memory of the persecution of the Jews') was launched at Spui25, Amsterdam. The book outlines ways in which the Netherlands has dealt with the memory of this history, from the first years after the liberation until the opening of the National Holocaust Museum in 2024. On the occasion of the presentation, a small symposium took place, in which Abram de Swaan (Amsterdam), Krijn Thijs (Germany Institute), Kathryn Brackney (Leiden) and Anne van Mourik (NIOD) highlighted some of the book's central themes from different perspectives. Fold, Stand, and Drape: Unweaving Physical vs. Digital Textile Design Considerations

During the ACM International Conference on Tangible, Embedded and Embodied Interaction (TEI), which took place between 11-14 February 2024 in Cork, Ireland, AHM PhD Candidate Sandra Kuipers presented 'Fold, Stand and Drape: Unweaving Physical vs. Digital Textile Design Considerations'. In this paper, which is part of her PhD research, Kuipers investigates fashion designers' implicit understanding of textiles and how, considering that fashion design has rapidly become a digital process, design considerations are influenced by interactions with physical textiles. 
Past Events

Mois Multi Festival, February 2024

During the Mois Multi Festival, taking place in February 2024 in Quebec City, Canada, AHM's Corina Apostol presented the talk "Immerse and Beyond: Redefining Artistic Space in the Digital Era." In the presentation, Apostol explored the impact of virtual productions on the sensual qualities of physical exhibition spaces, and how these can defy temporal and geographical constraints. Her analysis engaged with the international Beyond Matter project's quest to merge cultural heritage with cutting-edge virtual reality, offering a vanguard perspective on how computer-generated spaces can mold political and social narratives.

Taboo in Cultural Heritage Conference, 1-2 February

On February 1-2 2024, the Conference Taboo in Cultural Heritage took place in Amsterdam. The conference reflected on the concept of taboo in relation to cultural heritage in the context of colonialism and national socialism and their reverberations in society, and was organised by organised by the Open University of the Netherlands; Reinwardt Academie, University of the Arts; and AHM.
