April marked the start of the fourth edition of the online student conference ConNext. For four consecutive weeks, students from conservation training programmes around Europe present their object treatments and research within the field of wood, furniture and related materials conservation. A wide array of objects and materials will be discussed: from painted surfaces to objects damaged by flood and from polyurethane foam upholstery to non-invasive techniques for examining dyes and colourants. New Horizon Europe project: DIGHT-Net, Sustainable, Usable and Visible Digital Cultural Heritage: Twinning for Excellence In this new project, coordinated by Prof. Ihab Saloul, the University of Amsterdam will be working together with Tallinn University, the University of Bologna and the University of Turku to achieve a long-standing contribution to the European cultural heritage and its digital transformation. The goal of the project is to enhance research capacity, broaden the research partnership and increase the visibility and attractiveness of digital cultural heritage studies. To mobilise and amplify digital cultural heritage research locally, nationally and internationally, ensure sustainability and maximise the impact, the joint research hub of Digital Cultural Heritage studies (DIGHT-Hub) shall prototype a Twinned Digital Archive of Juri Lotman and Umberto Eco, and build a semiotic theory of digital cultural heritage.

### Dubbel geleefd leven. PINK de Thierry Anja Novak, 2024.


Anja Novak's essay "Dubbel geleefd. PINK de Thierry", was published in the March-April issue of *De Witte Raaf*. Novak discusses a number of performance-related art projects by the recently deceased Dutch artist PINK de Thierry (1943-2023). PINK de Thierry has created a unique body of work. In the 1980s to the mid-1990s, she regularly presented her family as a work of art under the title *L'Art du Bonheur*. This essay discusses PINK de Thierry's ambitious projects in the context of the history and theory of performance and installation art. The focus is on the artist's strategy to double down on the theatrical aspects of social behavior. You can find the essay here.

This book takes as its object of investigation an array of traumatic heritage sites and spaces of memory, including museums, former detention camps, and sites of commemoration, in Europe, Argentina, and Colombia, to investigate how various traumatic pasts can be preserved and transmitted through space, and which kind of actions might be taken both to improve knowledge of the past and to
