Palestine Teaches: Commemoration

4 January 2024, 17:00 - 20:00

How does one commemorate an ongoing catastrophe? What are the roles of monuments in commemoration, and why do they become victims of destruction? In this workshop, participants will watch the short film "Al Hissan," which tells the story of how scrap metal was welded together by a group of young people in the West Bank, using materials originating from destroyed houses and cars. Cultural practitioners will share insights to help understand the aesthetic and political choices Palestinians make in creating monuments. After this event on 4 January, participants will leave with a deeper understanding of the role of memorialization and commemoration. Conference: Taboo in Cultural Heritage

1 - 2 February 2024

Reinwardt Acadamy, Amsterdam

Taboo is a subject, word, or action that is avoided or forbidden for religious, social or political reasons. Although certain taboos appear to be virtually universal, most taboos vary with cultures and times. Objects, sites, or practices appropriated as cultural heritage, can at a later moment in history be redesignated as problematic, no longer conforming to certain norms and values. Conversely, (former) taboos can be contested, eventually triggering the 'heritagization' and display of hitherto banned objects and sites. The international conference 'Taboo in Cultural Heritage', aims to reflect on the concept of taboo in relation to cultural heritage in the context of colonialism and national socialism and their reverberations in society. The keynote speakers include Pumla Gobodo-Madikizela, Sharon Macdonald and Michael Rothberg. More information can be found here.

Conference: The Aesthetics of Geopower

The two-day conference 'The Aesthetics of Geopower: Imagining Planetary Histories and Hegemonies,' is taking 4-5 April. This conference explores how geopower intersects with aesthetics, taken expansively as referring to art, film, literature, and other forms of cultural practice, as well as sensed materiality and embodied perception. The premise is that the aesthetic, far from being secondary or supplemental to the forces shaping the earth, is centrally entailed and embedded in dynamics of geopower. Sponsored by the Amsterdam School for Cultural Analysis and Dutch Research Council, scholars are invited to explore how the human and nonhuman forces shaping and emerging from the earth are articulated in art and cultural practice. New Research Project, 14Colours: Combining Dye and Radiocarbon (14C) Analyses to Date Anthraquinone-Based Colourants in Historical Textiles

In this new research project, Maarten van Bommel (AHM-UvA), Laura Hendriks (HEIA-FR), Suzan Meijer (Rijksmuseum), and Ana Serrano (AHM-UvA) will develop a new protocol combining chromatography and radiocarbon analysis of red colourants in historical textiles to assess their origins. This cooperation between conservation scientists and textile conservators promotes interdisciplinary research to achieve supportive interpretations of the history of textiles and complement well-established art historical methods of textile provenance and date attribution. Moreover, it will enhance the objects' historical value in the museums' collections, possibly impacting future preservation, conservation and exhibition decisions. The project is financed by NICAS and the Branco-Weiss Fellowship - Society in Science. Click here to read more about the project.

NWO Open Science Fund awards OH-CORE

Sanneke Stigter's project Oral History-Collaborative Open Science Research Environment (OH-CORE) has been awarded within the NWO Open Science Fund. The project aims to lower the barriers that researchers encounter when analysing, depositing and re-using interview data, and to make collaboration possible between researchers and institutions when dealing with privacy sensitive data. The project will be carried out in collaboration with DANS-KNAW and SURF as an extension of the infrastructure research project Oral History - Stories at the Museum around Artworks (OH-SMArt). The goal is to significantly improve sustainable archiving and secure dissemination of unique resources for the social sciences and humanities. More information can be found here.

Prof. dr. Ella Hendriks receives NWO-Museum Grant

Together with her colleague-researcher M.I. Albrecht from Kasteel de Haar, AHM's Ella Hendriks has received an NWO-Museum Grant for research into a 15th-century altarpiece in the collection of Kasteel de Haar, the biggest castle in the Netherlands. The ensemble of Spanish paintings is unknown to the public, something further research aims to change. The NWO-Museum Grants give museums the possibility to do short-term research, to encourage academic research in the museum field.

4D Research Lab receives European funding

How can Virtual Reality and 3D be used to take archaeological education to a higher level? The 4D Research Lab of the University of Amsterdam will be working together with the Open University and universities from Bonn, Oslo and Lund to connect local initiatives of VR education and develop these further. The consortium has been awarded a subsidy of €400.000 from the Erasmus+ program of the European Union. For more information on the project, please see the website.

New AHM Members

Dr. Corina Apostol

Corina L. Apostol is an assistant professor of social practice in contemporary art and culture at the University of Amsterdam. She also serves as the associate producer of CULTUS by the artist Zach Blas, an immersive exploration of Al Gods, spirituality, and Silicon Valley's techno-religion. She served as a curator and a member of

the steering committee for "Beyond Matter" (2020–23), an international, practice-based research project taking cultural heritage and culture in development to the verge of virtual reality. Dr. Apostol obtained her Ph.D. from Rutgers University, where she was the Dodge Curatorial Fellow at the Zimmerli Art Museum (2010–16). She is currently coediting the volume *Flora Fantastic: From Orchidelirium to Eco-Critical Art*, which is set to be released in 2024 by Routledge.

Dr. Nour Munawar

Nour Munawar is an archaeologist and cultural heritage expert. He obtained his Ph.D. in heritage studies from the University of Amsterdam (UvA). Munawar's expertise extends beyond the fields of heritage and memory studies, historical and contemporary archaeology, museum studies, and encompasses identity and heritage politics, uses of the past, narrative theory, heritage governance in national and international contexts, colonialism and postcolonialism, migration and diaspora, and decolonization of heritage and museology in the Middle East and North Africa (MENA), the Arab region, Eastern Europe, and beyond. Munawar was recently awarded a prestigious grant from the Dutch Research Council (NWO) through the 'NWO Talent Program – VENI scheme 2022' to conduct his research on 'Decolonial Futures: Heritage, Memory, and Narratives in the Making in MENA' at the University of Amsterdam (UvA), Netherlands.

Dr. Ana Albano Serrano

Ana F. Albano Serrano was appointed as Assistant Professor at the Conservation and Restoration (C&R) department on September 1st, 2023. She first joined the University of Amsterdam in 2022 as lecturer and course coordinator for the C&R textile specialization course. Serrano is specialized in the combination of conservation, art history and science for the interdisciplinary research of heritage textiles, and the future preservation of their tangible and intangible narratives. After obtaining her PhD in History in 2016 through the NOVA University and the Rijksdienst voor het Cultureel Erfgoed (RCE), she worked in several post-doctoral projects at the University of Amsterdam and the RCE. Serrano is currently involved in the 14Colours project, funded by NICAS.

Dr. Joen Hermans

Joen Hermans currently holds a position as Assistant Professor

Conservation Science, which is split between the Faculty of Humanities and the Van 't Hoff Institute for Molecular Science at the Faculty of Science. In addition, he has a position as researcher at the Conservation & Science department of the Rijksmuseum. Previously, Hermans obtained a PhD degree on oil paint degradation from the University of Amsterdam, and was awarded a NWO-Veni grant in 2019. Hermans' research focuses on the chemistry of oil paint. With a combination of fundamental chemistry research methods and more applied methodologies, he tries to understand how the molecular structure of oil paint evolves over time, and how paint materials can deteriorate as a consequence of environmental conditions or conservation treatments. Additionally, he works on analytical methods that can help us understand the causes of deterioration in a variety of materials in art.

Dr. Claire Stocks

Claire Stocks currently holds a position as Assistant Professor at the Amsterdam Centre for Ancient Studies and Archaeology (ACASA) at the University of Amsterdam. Before coming to Amsterdam, she was Senior Lecturer for Classics at the University of Newcastle (2016-2023), and held lectureships at Radboud University, Nijmegen (2012-2016) and the University of Manchester (2011-2012). Stocks' research centres on two main areas: Roman literature, culture and memory studies and digital humanities (especially games) with a particular focus on how audiences conceptualize the past. Most recently she has worked with the Vindolanda Trust and Creative Assembly (makers of the *Total War* video game series) to produce the web-based game and online exhibition 'Vindolanda Adventure'.
